A Look Back on Ken Bain's Career

n this issue of Leaders & Learners, we are recognizing the many contributions made to public education, school system administration, the Ontario Public Supervisory Officers'

Association (OPSOA), and the Canadian Association of School System Administrators (CASSA) by Ken Bain. Ken is stepping down as CASSA's executive director following a dozen years in the role.

Ken was born in Toronto. He has Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Education, and Master of Science degrees from McMaster University, the University of Toronto, and Niagara University. He has dedicated his entire career in education to public schools in the Hamilton area, first in what was known as the English-language Public School District School Board No. 21. Following amalgamation in the late 1990s, he continued with the Hamilton-Wentworth District School Board (HWDSB).

He began teaching in 1975, keen to make a difference in the lives of students. A decade later, he made his first move into administration as the vice principal of a middle school. He later served as principal for five HWDSB schools, receiving the Prime Minister's Award for Integration of Exceptional Pupils for his work.

Ken then shifted to school system administration, serving HWDSB as interim assistant superintendent of schools, superintendent of education, and superintendent of education (operations). As superintendent, he received the HWDSB Profiling Excellence Award and the CASSA EXL Award on behalf of OPSOA.

Early in his career while a vice principal, Ken first encountered CASSA's former executive director Frank Kelly. At the time, Frank was Ken's school superintendent and would go on to become both a good friend and mentor. Ken has credited Frank with





teaching him the importance of developing and growing strong relationships in this work and the vital role of relationships for leaders to be able to make a positive, lasting, and sustainable difference.

In fact, Frank offered Ken his first principal assignment. Their paths would cross many times over the years, including when Ken became a superintendent with HWDSB in 1997 and a member of the OPSOA. Ken eventually became OPSOA's executive director in 2011–2012, a role in which Frank had also served two decades earlier.

Through his role with OPSOA and his relationship with Frank, Ken was introduced to CASSA (then known as the Canadian Association of School Administrators, or CASA). When Frank stepped down as CASSA's executive director in 2012, it was Ken who took on the role.

At the time, Ken expressed his enthusiasm to help the organization continue to grow by reaching out to non-member affiliates and increasing its profile. Under his direction and in collaboration with the executive and board of directors, CASSA has done just that. It has also offered tremendous learning and networking opportunities with a broad national perspective. The organization has continued to present relevant initiatives and highly successful national conferences, including pivoting to virtual gatherings when required. Ken's steady leadership leaves a lasting positive legacy with CASSA.

Ken is married to Eileen, and he is a father and grandfather. He is also a lifetime Hamilton Tiger-Cats fan.

On behalf of all CASSA members and those who have had the opportunity to work with Ken, we thank him for his service and dedication to public education and system administration over the years. We wish him the very best going forward.

NLASSA, due to Ken's and the board's support, is honoured to have St. John's selected as the host site for the 2025 conference.

Finally, I have come to know Ken and his wonderful wife Eileen on a personal level. In doing so, I came to discover that we share the love of travel. During the recent summer conference in Montreal, it was a pleasure to listen to stories about some of their many adventures. I was particularly interested in their love of cruising and some common destinations that we have visited. I wish Ken health and happiness as he retires from his role as CASSA's executive director. I'm sure he and Eileen will enjoy many more adventures and sunsets in far-away destinations!"

Announcing the Recipient and Nominees for the Inaugural Nelson Excellence in Leadership Award

ince 2002, the Canadian Association of School System Administrators (CASSA) has recognized the extraordinary efforts of Canadian school system leaders through the annual presentation of a national leadership award. From 2002 to 2023, this award was known as the EXL Award.

As of 2024, this award will be known as the Nelson Excellence in Leadership Award to recognize CASSA members who have exhibited exemplary leadership ability and who have enhanced school administration. We recognize and are grateful for the support of this award by Nelson Canada, Canada's leading kindergarten to Grade 12 educational publisher.

The recipient of the 2024 EXL Award, Reg Klassen, was announced at this year's conference in Montreal/Tiohtià:ke on July 4. Congratulations to

Reg, who will be invited to attend the 2025 AASA (The School Superintendents Association) National Conference on Education in New Orleans, Louisiana, as Canadian Superintendent of the Year.

Here are profiles on each of the deserving 2024 nominees. We commend all of them for their years of leadership excellence in public education.



Reg Klassen Manitoba Association of School Superintendents

Reg is the chief superintendent for the Frontier School Division (FSD) in Winnipeg. He previously served as superintendent for Rolling River School Division from 2008 to 2015 and for Garden Valley School Division from 2000 to 2001

He is described by peers as a deeply respected collaborator and system changer who uses his positional power to facilitate work in support of Indigenous education and reconciliation efforts. He has worked extensively and tirelessly with Indigenous communities and government to support student achievement and well-being. He pushes for equitable resource allocation for First Nations and rural communities with the provincial and federal governments. His successful initiatives include an all-day, every-day kindergarten program and a "Learning to 18" off-campus partnership that has resulted in higher Indigenous student graduation rates.

In the past three years, students at FSD have seen dramatic gains in their reading scores as a direct result of Reg's leadership and commitment to literacy and learning. He strives for excellence and equity, as seen in his advocacy for rural and marginalized students and his commitment to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Calls to Action.

Reg has served as a representative on the Manitoba Council for Leadership in Education for 16 years and on the Manitoba Poverty and Education Task Force and Attendance Task Force. He has delivered presentations to peers at annual general meetings, symposia and conferences, and to education students at the University of Manitoba. Reg played a key role in leading the Manitoba Association of School Superintendents (MASS) to become a full member of CASSA. He has served as vice president, president and past president for MASS and president-elect, president and past president for CASSA. He has been a member of CASSA for 15 years.



Kandy Mackey Association of Directors General of English School Boards of Québec

Kandy is the director general for the Eastern Townships School Board (ETSB) in Magog, Quebec. She previously served the board as its assistant director general and director of pedagogical services. Kandy's roles in public education also include school principal, elementary teacher and secondary teacher.

Her senior leadership work includes sitting on the Leadership Committee for English Education in Quebec and the Association of Directors General of English School Boards in Québec (ADGESBQ). In 2021, Kandy was appointed to a three-year mandate by the Quebec Minister of Education to sit on the Advisory Board for English Education to help represent the minority language community of Quebec. She sits on the Board of Governors of Champlain Regional College (Lennoxville campus) and is an active member of the table of Directors General for the Eastern Townships (Estrie) region of Quebec. She has also served as treasurer for ADGESBQ.

She initiated an inter-school board high school network to support student success in smaller, more rural communities in Quebec. Under her leadership, ETSB has consistently increased graduation rates for disabled students and has consistently posted higher graduation rates for disabled students than the provincial average.

Kandy holds graduate diplomas in both English and French from Bishop's University and Université de Sherbrooke. In 2014, she received the Outstanding Leadership in Education Award from the Eastern Townships Administrators' Association. She has been a member of CASSA for 11 years.



Devin Roberts
Northwest Territories
Superintendents' Association

Devin is the superintendent of education for the Beaufort-Delta Divisional Education Council (BDDEC) in Inuvik. He has also served as assistant superintendent and as a principal.

He collaboratively established a multi-year vision that addresses multiple components of the student experience. He also negotiated a partnership with Vancouver Island University to develop a community-based Bachelor of Education program, removing a barrier that prevented many Indigenous community members in the BDDEC region from pursuing a career in education. He created Indigenous Mentor and Indigenous Youth Mentor positions that support students in mental health, maintain connections to culture, and assist in transitioning students into post-secondary education, work, or community after Grade 12.

His commitment to diversity, equity, inclusion and well-being can be seen in his work to include local Indigenous governments as voting members of the District Education Council and to allocate funding to provide staff training with the Canadian Centre for Diversity and Inclusion.

He has served as chair of the NWTSA, a member of the Teacher Qualification Services Evaluation Committee, and the NWT School Calendar Committee.

Under his leadership, BDDEC received the 2023 silver award for organizational excellence from Excellence Canada. He has also held teaching and administration roles in the Sahtu and South Slave regions. Devin sits on the board of governors for Excellence Canada. He has been a member of CASSA for six years.



Katharine Stevenson Ontario Catholic Supervisory Officers' Association

Katharine is the superintendent of education for the Durham Catholic District School Board (DCDSB), a role she took on in 2022.

Her responsibilities include advancing human rights and equity as conditions for improved student learning, system-wide training related to anti-Black racism, 2SLGBTQ+ inclusion, and culturally responsive pedagogy and leadership. From 2013 to 2022, she served as a secondary school administrator in the Halton Catholic District School Board.

She is an integral member in the development of DCDSB's Focus on Faith theological framework, setting a consistent vision of Catholic education founded in justice. She is the board lead of its 2SLGBTQ+ Advisory Committee. Katharine is also a strong advocate for culturally responsive and relevant pedagogy.

Among her many accolades are the 2012 Father Angus MacDougall Award for Excellence in Family Life Education, presented by the Catholic Association of Religious and Family Life Educators of Ontario, and the 2014 Michael Carty Award, presented by the Catholic Education Foundation of Ontario in recognition of a school-based project celebrating the dignity and diversity of secondary school students.

She holds graduate degrees in religious education and theology. A respected thought leader, Katharine was a featured speaker at last year's Ontario Catholic School Trustees' Association annual general meeting and conference, where she delivered a presentation grounding the work of equity, diversity, and inclusion in legislative responsibility and a Catholic understanding of dignity of a human

person, community and common good, and option for the poor and vulnerable.

Growing in Faith, Growing in Christ is a religious education program endorsed by the Catholic Bishops of Ontario, Alberta, Saskatchewan and the Northwest Territories. It was developed in collaboration with Catholic educators from across Canada. The program is based on the Catholic Elementary Curriculum Policy Document for Religious Education, Grades 1 to 8, and Catholic School Kindergarten Program. She was a contributing author for both of these curriculum policy documents.

She was also a keynote speaker at the 2017 Identity and Curriculum in Catholic Education conference in Australia. She has authored numerous curriculum policy documents, resource manuals, and articles for national and international publications. Katharine has been a member of CASSA for two years.

Dr. Wilco Tymensen College of Alberta School Superintendents

Dr. Tymensen is the superintendent/ CEO for Horizon School Division based in Taber, Alberta, a position he has held



since 2013. Prior to this role, he served as the division's associate superintendent for curriculum and instruction. His leadership work with the division also includes serving as a principal from 2001 to 2006.

He has served on the College of Alberta School Superintendents (CASS) provincial executive from 2011 to 2014 and as its second and first vice president, president and past president from 2019 to 2024. From 2013 to 2015, he worked with the Alberta Education assistant deputy minister on the Inspiring Education Initiative. He has provided instruction, including at the graduate level, at Western University, Gonzaga University and the University of Lethbridge, and taught the Lead for Learning courses for CASS.

He is a leader who demonstrates a commitment to equity, diversity and inclusion through his work with at-risk youth in alternative and outreach programs. He is a founding member of the Alberta Outreach Educators Network. He was instrumental in creating the Taber Community Action and Prevention Society and the Taber Coalition for Action and Drug Awareness, working with local police, Family and Community Support Services, Child and Family Services, and Taber Adult Learning to bring the community together to collaborate to support students, families and the community.

He has served on over 30 committees throughout his career, and has delivered many presentations and published many articles.

His many accolades include the Lethbridge Association for Community Living Betty Grigg Inclusive Education Award and the South Grow Regional Innovation Award for Excellence in Collaboration, Innovation and Partnerships. Dr. Tymensen sat on the CASSA board from 2020 to 2021. He has been a member of CASSA for 18 years.

What upgrades (for example, hallway size, playground equipment, wheelchair ramps) have been made? What is the importance of these upgrades?
- School maintenance: Many of Canada's schools are several decades (or even a century!) old, and in desperate need of maintenance. How has your school upgraded, who was involved in the upgrade's success, and what has the result been? Examples could be new wiring for technology, upgraded cooling and heating systems, new or upgraded air purification systems, etc.
